The basic strength of the college is its faculty who are extremely dedicated and student friendly, and secondly our students, who still not being urbanised are basically obedient learners. Our basic weakness is lack of space for which students cannot be given great access to internet facilities through a computer center.

The moment funds are available immediate construction of at least 12000 Sq. Ft. of building area needs to be constructed. A separate cycle stand for girl's students also needs to be constructed.

• A completely innovative practice called the BOMBARDMENT SESSIONS are organized by every department at least twice a year. FEEDBACK REPORT OF IQAC REGARDING PARENT TEACHERS' MEET

2013-14

The feedback analysis of Parent- Teacher meetings organized by the different departments is once again practically the same as in 2011-12 and 2012-13.

There was a faint sign of dissatisfaction with the guardians of students in the English department regarding the lack of teaching staff. The commonest question asked was why the department is not appointing Guest Teachers against the vacant posts.

The IQAC has spoken to the teachers of the department about why they do not request the Principal to appoint Guest Teachers. The reply was very significant. The teachers do not wish to compromise on quality and because MA pass outs with NET are mostly absorbed in full time posts, there is dearth of efficient teachers who can be appointed as Guests. For the meager salaries of Guest Teaching positions hardly any qualified young teacher would be available even if the college advertises in the big newspapers. The Teachers have been happy to work overtime helping students to their greatest possible abilities. Since results in the department have been consistently good since more than a decade the IQAC has decided to leave the matter entirely to the teachers in the department.
